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Comprehensive development in any society should be based on three sides; the governmental sector consisting of ministries and various government institutions and agencies, the private sector, and the non-governmental sector or the so-called civil society.

The integration of these tools is the best way to achieve the real and necessary participation of all resources of comprehensive powers in the society with all its elements, categories and experiences.

In light of this concept, the comprehensive development process witnessed by Egypt is currently concerned with all aspects of political, economic, social and cultural development, and is not limited to the economic financial aspect.

Besides the state's leadership in the process of economic reform and the development of infrastructure for utilities and cities, the private sector has had the largest role in the implementation phase of all national and service projects alike.

The most important observation in these accomplishments is the respect for the principles of Egyptian human rights everywhere in Egypt as development projects and utilities covered all the Egyptian regions and governorates in a balanced manner.

At the same time, civil society has been an essential partner in development efforts, and many efforts have been exerted to encourage the private sector to contribute to the development process, whether through the new law regulating civil work (Law No. 149 of 2019), which gives more facilities and freedom for civil work to serve society in all political, social fields and others, or through many initiatives that have been



sponsored by the state to encourage civil work, such as the "Long Live Egypt" initiative.

What is so important in the development process in Egypt is focusing on building the Egyptian human being and enhancing capabilities of the human resources, not only to support development efforts but also as part of the rights of citizens.

The interest in health care has been at the forefront of the comprehensive development in Egypt, through launching numerous national initiatives such as the "100 Million Health Initiative", which included medical examination for about 60 million citizens, as well as initiatives to eliminate hepatitis and communicable disease, and health care for women and school children etc., and to implement the comprehensive health insurance projects for all Egyptians.

Education development project has been among the priorities and all efforts and resources are now being harnessed to achieve all success.

On the other hand, significant progress has been made to guarantee the rights of many social groups, mainly women's rights and efforts to empower them on the political, economic and social fields. These efforts have made strides in this path. The same applies to young people who now have unprecedented opportunities to take over the responsibility; some of them have already assumed leadership positions that had never been available before. And this also applies to other groups such as people with disabilities and the low-income groups. Efforts has been exerted to raise the minimum wage and replace unsafe residential areas with new housing, neighborhoods and cities with complete modern facilities. This is in addition to many other integrated social programs to meet the individual and collective "right to development" of all citizens.

Building the human being, enhancing his capabilities and providing him with opportunities for development, education and care is the basis for successful development; providing the human resources that are capable of achieving development. At the same time, it is a human right in Egypt, it is the duty of the state to provide it as it is the duty of the individual to respond to it and to play his/her role for his own benefit, family, community and homeland.
